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# Bipartisan Extenders Bill Passes House, Faces Uncertain Future in the Senate

- HR 7024, "Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act of 2024," passed House of Representatives, January 31, 2024
  - The bill passed the House of Representatives unchanged on January 31, 2024
  - Passed on a motion to suspend the rules 357-70 in favor (required a ¾ majority yes vote)

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# Bipartisan Extenders Bill Passes House, Faces Uncertain Future in the Senate



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- HR 7024, "Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act of 2024," passed House of Representatives, January 31, 2024
  - Reports later in the week suggested that the overwhelming support in the House is not having the effect of pushing the Senate to act
  - Senate is scheduled to go out on recess beginning February 12 (one week)
  - Not clear if the bill will pass, if there will be changes and, if it does become law, when that would happen

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# SALT Cap Partial Short-Term Relief to Be Brought to a Vote in the House

- HR 7160, "SALT Marriage Penalty Relief Act," Introduced January 31, 2024
  - Republicans from higher tax states had threatened to block a vote on any tax bill that did not include SALT cap relief
  - Speaker Johnson has promised not to bring a bill to the floor without such a provision in 2023 in the process that led to his election as Speaker of the House
  - Agreed to bring a very limited short-term SALT relief bill to the floor in the House in order to secure passage of HR 7024

### SALT Cap Partial Short-Term Relief to Be Brought to a Vote in the House

### SEC. 2. MODIFICATION OF LIMITATION ON DEDUCTION FOR CERTAIN STATE AND LOCAL TAXES.

- **(a) In General.**—Section 164(b)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 is amended by adding at the end the following: "In the case of a joint return for a taxable year beginning after December 31, 2022, and before January 1, 2024, if the taxpayer's adjusted gross income for such taxable year is less than \$500,000, subparagraph (B) shall be applied by substituting '\$20,000' for '\$10,000'."
- **(b) Effective Date.**—The amendment made by this section shall apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2022.

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# SALT Cap Partial Short-Term Relief to Be Brought to a Vote in the House





- HR 7160, "SALT Marriage Penalty Relief Act," Introduced January 31, 2024
  - It's not clear if there are the votes to pass this bill, although pointing out the marriage penalty may help passage
  - Note that there is no way the IRS could automate refunds arising from this provision, as this could easily be the difference between itemizing and not itemizing deductions

#### **Tax Filing Season Began on January 29**





- "2024 tax filing season starts as IRS begins accepting tax returns today; taxpayer help expands this year with more in-person hours, better service, improved tools", IR-2024-24, January 29, 2024
  - IRS began accepting returns on January 29
  - Reminds taxpayers this year returns are due on April 15, 2024 (except in Maine or Massachusetts where it will be April 17, 2024 due to Patriot's Day and Emancipation Day)
  - "Where's My Refund" will provide more detailed information this year

### **Tax Filing Season Began on January 29**

- "2024 tax filing season starts as IRS begins accepting tax returns today; taxpayer help expands this year with more in-person hours, better service, improved tools", IR-2024-24, January 29, 2024
  - The agency expects to receive 146 million individual income tax returns
  - Uncertainty about potential tax changes complicate filing decisions
    - IRS would recalculate refunds for child tax credit
    - But other items can't be automatically corrected by the IRS

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

  - New Forbes newsletter begins by giving the case of a Texas CPA firm that fell victim to a phishing email
  - Part-time staffer received an email purporting to be from Microsoft for an Office 365 password expiration notice
  - After she responded to the notice and "updated" her password, the firm noticed unusual downloads shut down her access

- However, as the attackers had access to her email account for a period of time, they were able to do a password reset on her access to the firm portal
- The damage was done--they had obtained access to confidential client information
- Article details the steps the firm had to take to deal with the situation
- Also made clear no one is "too small" to be targeted

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

  - Remember that you operate under IRS standards for data protection and, if you are a CPA, the newly effective data protection rules of SSTS §1.3
  - Steps that could have prevented or limited the damage in this situation
    - Two factor authentication (though could be limited in impact--but likely would have blocked the portal password change)
    - Training staff in likely security attacks (phishing is the big one)

  - IRS has already warned professionals of the "new client" scams ramping up as always at the beginning of tax season.

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
